Monday	As you know, our topic this term has been "Where did the wheels on the bus go?", and we have learned a lot about different types of transport. This week, we are going to read a new story. This is about a very wonderful journey, on a very special type of transport! Listen to the story of "The Snail and the Whale" here https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=3 ZAtKDaFU6c What was special about the story? Did you notice? It was a rhyming story. Remember rhymes are words that sound similar because they have the same ending, e.g snail/whale. Can you listen to the story again, and this time listen for the words that rhyme. Make a list of rhyming pairs.	Last week we learned all about time, we used phrases like o'clock and half past. I am sure you are excellent at showing the time on clocks now. See if you can draw clocks and show different times, can you write the time in words underneath? Eg. Half past three, six o'clock You could use the 'Blank clocks' sheet or draw your own.	Play flashcards with all of the tricky and high frequency words you have been learning in phase 5. You can use the resources from last week's learning grid, or find them on "Phonics Play" online. See if you can draw pictures and name transport that flies! How many can you think of? Then have a go at cutting out and 'making your own transport!'
Tuesday	Listen to the story again. Can you remember all of the different places they visited? Using time connectives, (first, next, after that, then, meanwhile, last of all, finally etc) write a recount of their journey. First the snail and the whale went to Next theyFinally. Try to include all of the places they visited and remember to put them in the right order. You can use the "time connectives" sheet attached to help you to sort your sentences in order if you like? Cut up the words and use them to begin your sentences. Remember to leave finger spaces and end with a full stop. Try to form your letter	Look at times like half past 3, talk about how half past means the same as thirty minutes past. Can children match the time in words to the digital times? Have a go on the 'Matching Times' sheet. You can use this game to practise doing it http://www.scootle.edu.au/ec/viewing/L9643/index.html	Phonics learning opportunities: To know alternative spellings for the loal phoneme. Read the "phoneme spotter" text aloud with your grown-up. Listen carefully for the loal phoneme. Reread the first sentence or two again and put your thumbs up when you hear that phoneme (sound). (You may find this easier with your eyes closed while your grown-up reads to you). Use the phoneme spotter sheet and underline all words you can find containing the phoneme. See how many ways of spelling the phoneme there are. You can jot these down on the side of the page.
