Tuesday	Create a title for your fact sheet.  What sections could you include? Can you think of any titles for these?  e.g  where do they live?]  what do they eat?  Add some notes and pictures to each section of your plan.	Learn how to spell your numbers from zero to twenty.  Ask a grown up to write them out for you and copy them. Write out the numeral and the word next to it.  Do you notice any patterns to help you to remember?	Use your spellings to write sentences. Remember to use your phonic knowledge to spell your words.	PSHE/Circle Time:  This week we are thinking about how we are the same and how we are different to others.  Sometimes it is our similarities and differences that others find difficult to understand.  Talk about how you are similar to your friends and how you are different. What makes you proud to be you? Create a poster about what makes you special.
Wednesday	Begin to write your fact sheet.  Remember to write the title in the centre.  Under each section begin to write about what you have found out.  Remember capital letters, full stops and finger spaces.	Numbers 10-20 can be represented with ten (sticks) and ones (cubes). Look at the part whole models and work out the numbers.	Introduce the new phase 5 sound of 'aw'. Do they notice that it sounds like 'or' but the spelling of the grapheme is different?  Look at some ay words, where is it usually in the word?
